The Adjective Clause

- An adjective clause is a subordinate clause that is used as a adjective to modify a noun or pronoun.
- An adjective clause contains a verb and its subject.
- Most adjective clauses immediately follows the world they modify.
- They begin with relative pronouns.

The Adverb Clause

- An adverb clause is a subordinate clause that is used as a adverb to modify a verb, an adjective, or and adverb.
- An adverb clause answers any of the following questions:
 - How?
 - How Much?
 - How Long?
 - Where?
 - Why?
 - To what extent?
 - Under what conditions?/conditional
- They begin with subordinating conjunctions, but do not always modify the world before it.
- When it comes at the beginning of the sentence, it is usually followed by a comma.
- With adverb clauses, you can move the clause (rearrange sent.) and it will still make sense 99% of the time.
